The Product

The Shenyin Wanguo RMB Mainland Investment Fund (the "Sub-Fund") invests primarily in RMB-denominated and settled debt securities issued in the PRC through a RQFII quota of the RQFII Holder which is a holding company of the Fund Manager. **Risk Disclosure**

Market Review

In December, the Political Bureau meeting and the Central Economic Work Conference were held, further outlining directions for economic development in the coming year. Policies were highlighted in areas such as "expanding domestic demand," "extraordinary counter-cyclical regulation," "stabilizing the real estate and stock markets," and consumer welfare. Regarding economic targets for next year, after stating the goal of "maintaining stable economic growth," the meetings emphasized the need to "ensure stability in employment and overall price levels," pointing out the importance of "goal-oriented guidance to achieve an optimized combination of steady growth, stable employment, and a reasonable recovery in prices." On the monetary policy front, it was proposed to maintain "appropriate easing." Following the economic work meeting, the stock market performed generally, while the bond market saw a significant surge. The yields on Chinese government bonds across various maturities declined sharply, with the 1, 3, 5, 7, and 10-year yields falling by 29 basis points, 23 basis points, 24 basis points, 29 basis points, and 34 basis points, respectively.

Market Outlook and Strategy


Despite market expectations for a possible reserve requirement ratio cut or interest rate reduction in December, these expectations did not materialize. Nonetheless, the bond market still experienced a significant increase, which may reflect a rather pessimistic outlook on economic growth prospects in the absence of effective economic stimulus. However, we believe that the decision-makers still hold high expectations for economic growth in the coming year and will take appropriate stimulus measures at the right time. Therefore, there should be neither excessive anticipation of strong stimulus policies nor an overly pessimistic view of the economic situation. The current market response seems to be more influenced by short-term sentiments, which may have exceeded what the actual situation reflects.


Comments on portfolio

This month, the net asset value (Class I) return of the RQFII fund was 0.91%, while the ChinaBond Comprehensive Full Price Index (CBCFPI) rose significantly by 1.54% for the month. The fund underperformed the index mainly due to its shorter duration and weaker performance in the equity portion. As of the end of December, the portfolio held approximately 94.05% in bonds, of which 32.22% were convertible bonds, and 3.72% in mutual funds/equities, slightly lower than the previous period. Most of the corporate bonds held were investment-grade. As of the end of October, the fund's average duration was 1.63 years, with an average yield to maturity of 1.39%. The portfolio comprised 33 holdings, achieving full diversification.
